Notes from the Chairman

- Updating the Parish Plan has taken some time during the last few months, and a series of meetings to refresh the 2008 Plan have taken place with a view to keeping our parish 'green and pleasant' for generations to come. The final draft is now on the Parish Council website and we would welcome your feedback. Copies can be downloaded.
- The issues of flooding never go far away and the plans for Lower Hall quarry look like they are to be submitted in early 2022. This application is front and centre of our aspirations, as we need the LCC flood prevention scheme to alleviate the risk of flooding in the lower lying areas of the parish. We were pleased to see a number of affected residents at the November meeting, and a meeting with the Environment, South Ribble Borough Council and our MP is currently being arranged.

Other grave concerns about the proposal are traffic congestion, air and noise pollution. Together with the local authorities, we will work tirelessly to oppose this application.

- We will also be keeping an eye on the landscaping of recent developments, including the Enterprise Zone.
- The two public houses in the parish are very valued assets and it is with this that an Asset of the Community Award was given to the Nab's Head a few years ago. It ran out in November, so a new one has been applied for.
- For a number of years we have expressed concern about the condition of verges and footways, but some are still in a deplorable state. At the September meeting a concerned resident also drew our

attention to the problem, so we have made a small allowance in the precept to allow us to engage a lengthsman. We will collaborate with neighbouring Councils to alleviate the problem, as we dip our toe in the water and see what we can do, both now and in future years.

- SRBC is aware of the effects that Covid 19 is having and a booklet will be printed in the New Year to highlight areas of help for people who need a cup of tea, a chat and signposting to services available.
- It just leaves me to wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a prosperous New Year.

Looking Back: Robert Bolton c1796-c1858.

Fose [ie.wise/witty] Robin – was a maternal uncle of William Billington, and gave lots encouragement to him. Robert was born at Samlesbury 'Old' Hall at the time when it was divided into tenements and let out to hand-loomers. Young Robert could turn his hand to anything and got by on part-time jobs – 'weighing weft and doing' in a handloom warehouse, 'hawking tea' and collecting for the 'Preston Burial Society.'

One night foce Robin was summoned to the Myerscough Smithy (a pub not far from the Hall), because a travelling Scot, having been told of Robert's quick wits, had bet a night's 'fuddle' to all present, that he could puzzle Foce Robin.

Robert was instructed to select three knives out of the landlord's knife-box, so picked two very sharp ones and a third with a wooden handle, or *haft*. He was then told to take them out of doors and stick them into anything he chose, and on his return he would be told what the last knife would be stuck into.

Once in the yard, Robert used the sharpest knife to cut away the wooden haft of the third knife, before putting the blade up the back lining of his coat. The next knife then went in the midden and the last into a haystack – then he presented himself once again in the bar.

'All was silence — all was expectation as the Scot stood up triumphantly and declaimed, "The last knife is stuck in the haft!" '

To the utter confusion of the Scot and the measureless mirth of the rest of the company, Foce Robin doffed his coat and shook the bare blade of the third knife onto the floor!
